## Characteristics and Service Needs of Low-Income Residents in Marshall, Norman, and Polk Counties

Tri-Valley Opportunity Council, Inc. is a non-profit community action agency headquartered in Crookston. In existence since 1965, Tri-Valley provides services in 84 counties in Minnesota and Northeast North Dakota with a primary service area of west Polk, west Marshall and Norman counties. The mission of Tri-Valley is to provide opportunities to improve the quality of life for people and communities.

## **Board of Directors Priorities**

## <u>Priority 1</u>– Improve/promote/ advance the objective of coordinating the various services for area preschool children with Head Start:

- Increase the number of children served by Head Start in Marshall County.
- Increase the number of child care slots available in the service area
- Develop the area Early Childhood workforce.

## <u>Priority 2</u> – Improve/promote/advance the objective of keeping seniors in their homes and avoiding premature nursing home placement:

- Caring Companion Program will aggressively market private pay opportunities.
- Reach out to county workers to increase referrals.
- Tri-Valley will increase its presence at area service provider meetings.

## **<u>Priority 3</u>** – Improve/promote/advance housing options in the service area:

- A mitigation fund will be developed to help convince landlords to lease to hard to house individuals.
- Bring housing rehab resources to the service area.
- Enhance case management services for housing.

## **<u>Priority 4</u>** – Improve/promote/advance Family Engagement in the service area:

- Develop new financial literacy trainings to compliment Four Cornerstones.
- Provide more opportunities to attend parenting classes in the service area.
- Continue work on a pilot project with the Council of Collaboratives to bring Family Navigators to area schools.

## **Demographic Summary**

#### **Population**

Population change within the report area from 2000-2016 is shown below. During the fourteen-year period, total population estimates for the report area declined by -2.8 percent, decreasing from 48,966 persons in 2000 to 47,594 persons in 2016.

The greatest loss occurred in Norman County which experienced a -10.8% decrease in population, whereas Polk County experienced a positive change of 0.58%. Of our population, 6.28% are under the age of 5, 17.37% are age 5 to 17, 59% are 18 to 64, and 17.35% are over 64 years old. (*Data Source: US Census Bureau, American Community Survey. 2012-16. #### Income

According to the U.S. Census, median annual household incomes ranged from a low of \$50,893 in Polk County to a high of \$54,651 in Marshall County. The median income for the state of Minnesota is \$65,583. (*Data Source: US Census Bureau, Small Area Income & Poverty Estimates. 2016. Source geography: County*)

#### Homeownership

The U.S. Census Bureau estimated there were 14,622 homeowners in the report area in 2016, and 77.23% owner occupied homes in the report area for the 5 year estimated period from 2012 - 2016. (*Data Source: US Census Bureau, American Community Survey. 2012-16. Source geography: County*)

#### **Nutrition**

The report area showed that 3,236 students (or 41.87 percent) were eligible for free or reduced price lunches during the 2013 - 2014 school year, which is more than the Minnesota average of 38.1 percent. (*Data Source: National Center for Education Statistics, NCES - Common Core of Data. 2015-16. Source* geography: Address)

#### **Ethnicity**

According to ACS 2012-2016 5 year population estimates, the white population comprised 94.74% of the report area, black population represented 1.1%, and other races combined were 4.16%. Persons identifying themselves as mixed race made up 2.41% of the population. (*Data Source: US Census Bureau, American Community Survey. 2012-16. Source geography: County*)

#### Poverty

2016 poverty estimates show a total of 6,090 persons living below the poverty level in the report area.. According to the U.S. Census, the poverty rate for the area increased by 2.98%, compared to a national increase of 2.7%. According to the American Community Survey 5 year estimates, an average of 11.71 percent of all persons lived in a state of poverty during the 2012 - 2016 period. The poverty rate for all persons living in the report area is less than the national average of 15.11 percent. (*Data Source: US Census Bureau, American Community Survey. 2012-16. Source geography: Tract*)

According to the Tri-Valley Community Needs Assessment survey, poverty was seen as the biggest concern in the report area.

#### Child Care

The number of children ages 0 - 5 potentially needing child care in the three county area is 3,056. The capacity of licensed child care providers for children 0 - 5 is 2,370. This shows a decrease of 228 spaces from last year. These numbers indicate that an estimate of 686 children and their families must find alternative sources of child care or that a parent does not or can not participate in the community workforce. Parents choosing child care which is not licensed will generally include unlicensed friends, family or neighbor care.

#### **Unemployment**

According to the U.S. Department of Labor, unemployment for this one year period fell from 1,075 persons to 1,002 persons, a rate change of -0.21% percent. Overall, the report area experienced an average 3.8% percent unemployment rate in November 2017. (*Data Source: US Department* of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics. 2017 - November. Source geography: County)

#### <u>Overall</u>

Community perceptions indicate that this area has a high quality of living standard with ability to meet basic needs the greatest strength of the report area.

## The Good News


• The report area has higher rates of children staying in school and getting an associates degree as compared to the rest of the state. (*Data Source: US Census Bureau, American Community Survey. 2012-16. Source geography: County*)

• The percentage of persons uninsured ranged from 5.3% in Polk County, to 6.8% in Norman County. The service area percentage of uninsured is 4.47% compared to the national average of 9.16%. (*Data Source: US Census Bureau, American Community Survey. US Census Bureau, Small Area Health Insurance Estimates. 2015. Source geography: County*)

• The report area has one of the lowest rates of Child Protective Services needs in the state in 2013. (*Data Source: Minnesota Department of Human Services, Minnesota's Child Welfare Report for 2014*) • According to the Tri-Valley Community Needs Assessment survey, basic needs, education, and health care were seen as the biggest strengths of the report area.


• It is estimated that 7.2% of all households were living in poverty within the report area, compared to the national average of 11.3%. Of the households in poverty, female headed households represented 3.1% of all households in poverty, compared to 2.9% and 1.1% of households headed by males and married couples, respectively. (*Data Source: US Census Bureau, American Community Survey. 2012-16. Source geography: County*)

• The median commute time, according to the American Community Survey (ACS), for the report area is 13.69 minutes shorter than the national median commute time of 24.95 minutes.(*Data Source: US Census Bureau, American Community Survey. 2012-16. Source geography: County*)









#### FOR LOW-INCOME INDIVIDUALS AND/OR FAMILIES:

- Provided 185,433 rides.
- Provided 5,593 information and referral calls.
- Provided emergency car or home repair to 93 individuals.
- Provided referrals for emergency food assistance to 1,139 individuals.
- Provided referrals for emergency medical care to 37 individuals.
- Provided emergency rent or mortgage assistance to 177 indivduals.
- Provided emergency payments to vendors for fuel and energy bills for 553 low-income individuals.
- Assisted 59 individuals complete ABE/GED and receive certificate or diploma.
- Assisted 57,139 individuals get access to reliable transportation and/or driver's license.

### FOR INFANTS/CHILDREN AND FAMILIES:

- Assisted 1,177 infants and children obtain age appropriate immunizations, medical, and dental care.
- Improved the health and physical development of 1,180 infants and children as a result of providing adequate nutrition.
- Provided preschool activities to develop school readiness to 362 children.
- Ensured that 1,323 parents and other adults learned and exhibited improved parenting skills.
- Ensured that 1,306 parents and other adults learned and exhibited improved family functioning skills.


#### FOR SENIORS:
